If you have to re-home your pet:

- Take a good picture (a photo of your pet's face and one of the whole body). A photo next to a body helps to show size relation.
- Create a biography (include age, weight, color and sex). Provide medical information (are they spayed/neutered, last vaccinations and when, heartworm prevention history; flea/tick prevention history, microchipped, any other medical information (past dentals, issues requiring medication or other forms of treatment). Include in biography any special training (crate trained, obedience) or talents.
- Be up front about any behavior issues.
- List your re-home fee. Research local shelter and rescue group adoption fees.
- Make a flyer to post through e-mail and on social media, display at pet-related businesses (groomers, box retailers, vet clinics, dog parks). Send to rescues and shelters. Even though they may not have room for your pet, they may know of someone looking for a pet like yours. Ask if any of them offer courtesy postings on their websites.
- Advertise through ReHomeYourPets.com and AdoptAPet.com.
